Junior Coordinator's Season Report 2022-2023

Thankfully COVID did not have any impact on this season but the same cannot be said for the weather with three of the first four weekends impacted by rain, plus the first weekend in February. Otherwise, the season went relatively smoothly.

Four out of a possible 15 teams made the semi-finals in the weekend competition but unfortunately none were able to make it through to the grand final. It was a similar story in the girl's competition where we had one of four teams making the semi-finals but unfortunately Stage 2 Maroon weren't able to progress any further.

We fielded 26 teams in total this season; in the weekend competition we had eight U10 teams, five U12, five U14, four U16 and one U18, with the girl's competition fielding four teams across the three stages.

We had a number of boys and girls being selected to represent the Eastern Cricket Association in the representative competition in January. In the U14 competition the ECA team won the grand final, beating the South East Cricket Association by 3 wickets. Luca Rhodes was the leading wicket taker for the team with 17 wickets throughout the competition at an average of 10.59, including 5/15 off seven overs against Nth West Metro in Round 4. Theo Nikolich played one of the innings of the competition in Round 5 with his match-winning 67 off 43 balls, including 4 fours and a whopping 7 sixes. Well done to all those who were selected in representative sides.

The key to developing children into talented athletes who also play the game in the spirit it is intended is to have dedicated coaches and team manager and again we had over 60 parents volunteer to coordinate training and match day each and every week. My sincere thanks to each and every one of you for doing a sensational job this season.

The Age Level Coordinators (ALCs) also play a significant support role for coaches, team managers, parents and players. To Jo Bradley (Girls), Tim Cairns (U16), Will Gordon (U14), Tim Dichiera (U12) and Andrew Walton (U10), a big thank you from me for taking on this important role. The season got off to a seamless start again through the tireless work of Louise Dichiera as Club Administrator continuing this on throughout the season helping parents navigate their way, particularly those that are new to cricket and require direction and support.

Finally, thanks to the Club Executive for the support you provide the junior program, in particular Richard Hinds for ensuring grounds and equipment are available and President Stuart Whiley whose commitment to the club as both administrator and junior coach is absolutely fantastic.

I hope all families enjoyed the season and look forward to welcoming everyone back to the club for the 2023-24 season.

What a wonderful season overall, with a few extra matches early in handling a soggy start that washed out lots of competitions around Melbourne, a benefit in having BSO and a supportive group across the eight ECC Under 10 teams, allowed us to adapt and provide plenty of cricket for the players in making 1028 runs and taking 51 wickets over eleven matches against opposition.

Every year of being involved in this age group, the magical moments that randomly occur on game day, practice and the impromptu social connections are great life experiences for the group as individuals and together as a team. Yet this is only possible due to the incredible support, care and effort from everybody within U10 Green

For continuity from practice to match day, the following methods in place from recent seasons that work rather well from observing and listening to feedback, being able to assess how we could find a balanced level of improving together, the focus has been for the players to be guided as follows:

- Movement patterns = feet & body position to handle ball, running between wickets, bowling run ups, batting set up for quality contact
- Decision making = confidence, inclusion, leadership, having a go, handling batting & bowling orders
- Happiness = sharing roles, practice drills of match sense in working together, sharing competitive experiences

This season at practice, we were able to step up the levels of concentration and complexity such that I would usually do with a senior group, the players demonstrated a very good standard of improvement and accepting competitive challenges in small teams.

The players

And finally, to the players. Thank you for being a great team and for contributing to the fun we had in this strange season, We only had 1 home game, and two sessions in the nets. But you all coped magnificently with these challenges with good humour, and you also adapted to the different roles you played with bat or ball.

Xavier is a prodigiously talented cricketer, whose performances behind the stumps this season were so good that they were acknowledged by every opposition coach this season. Not blessed with a large wingspan, Xav more than makes up for it with incredible footwork, soft hands and wise cracks that would make Ian Healy blush. Xav is also one of our leading batters with a great technique and an ability to adapt his game to the situation. He had a very consistent season at the top of the order, scoring 99 runs, the second highest for the season. Xav also emerged as a terrific leader this year, with astute reading of the game and captaining our semi-final team with great skill and judgement.

Harvey is the ultimate team player, always putting the team before his own interests and always doing what was asked of him. His batting technique is astonishingly good, getting his head over the ball and using the pace of the ball with great effect. He displayed great courage opening the batting in every game, often against the best bowlers and provided us with a solid platform in every game. His 38 against North Alphington's powerful attack was arguably the innings of our season, and drew high praise from the opposition. Harvey racked up 80 runs at an average of 27 (the highest in the team), which is a terrific season from an opener. Harvey is also a very good fielder, saving many runs prowling around point and cover. A talented wicketkeeper, he showed his selflessness once again by allowing Xavier to keep and being more than happy just to field, which he did with much enthusiasm.

Elliot has had a fine all-round season, and has been one of our most reliable performers, making 72 runs and taking 9 wickets over the 7 games. His bowling action is simple and effortlessly elegant, consistently landing lovely outswingers at good pace on a full length, which will always yield plenty of wickets and concede few runs. His 3/9 off 7 overs against Bulleen was crucial in a tight win, whilst his blistering 39 off 31 balls in Clifton Hill's sandpit showed the power of his batting. His extraordinary pull shot against Box Hill was memorable and was probably the shot of the season.

Tom had limited opportunities this season with his finger injury at the start of the season, particularly with the bat. He still bowled some nice spells, landing on a consistent line and length, which proved difficult to score from. He bowled an excellent spell against North Alphington, building pressure and changing the momentum of the game. He also bowled very well against Box Hill, where he was unlucky not to get a few wickets.

Joe is the heartbeat of this team, bringing astounding energy and enthusiasm every week. He cares deeply for and has a lot of fun with all his teammates, which has made this season so enjoyable. Joe is an absolute delight to coach, is a natural leader with a good understanding of cricket. He is always seeking to improve his game and got better as the season progressed. He has a happy knack of picking up wickets at crucial times, including three clutch wickets against Bulleen. He also performed well with the bat, usually bearing the brunt of the bowling at the top of the order – his 33 against Surrey Hills was a terrific innings, showing great concentration. Joe has made a wonderful, all-round contribution to the team this season, and I am delighted to give him the Coach's Award.

Fred is our most athletic player, with his lengthy bowling run up a sight to behold. He enjoyed the responsibility of taking the new ball and leading the attack. He bowls at good pace, moves the ball through the air and beat the outside edge a lot, so was unlucky to only take 1 wicket for the season. His consistency improved as the season went on and he bowled some searing spells at times. Fred has great power and flair with his batting, hitting some powerful shots that are beyond most batters of his age. He got a start every time he batted, scoring 68 runs for the season, and a highest score of 21. The scoreboard was always ticking over nicely when Fred was batting, and it was pleasing to see his improvement in balancing his natural instincts to attack and defending his wicket.

Isaac was a great team player and always embraced his role with enthusiasm. He was one our best and most reliable fielders, with a great arm and taking some nice catches. Against Bulleen, he opened the batting and showed enormous determination and concentration making 6 off 51 balls on a slow ground. He also made the crucial breakthrough in dismissing their captain Stackwood-Smith. He also bowled well in a nice partnership with Tom Wilkinson which changed the game's momentum against North Alphington.

Noah P – has enormous talent with a natural left arm swing into the right hander, which is unplayable at this level if it's bowled in the right spot. That game was memorable as he scored his highest ever score (31) on a very slow ground, with his Dad watching proudly. Noah is a hugely popular and self-effacing member of the team, and always makes sure others are included.

Albert is a handy bowler and might focus on this even more - he took our third most wickets for the season and always looked dangerous. Albert was also one of our 'keeping three musketeers, and he worked hard on his glovework and improved over the season. Based on the MyCricket algorithm, Albert won the third most Champion Player points for the season - a good reflection of Albert's all-round effort and contribution. If Albert keeps working at his game he could be a really capable all-rounder in higher grades.

Levi Kovac had an outstanding season. Levi was our best bowler and comfortably took the most wickets in the team (11). In our view, Levi was one of the best few bowlers in the comp. A couple of his late inswingers would have been a handful for a player at any level. Levi also made important runs with his mix of cuts, glides and smart running. Levi was our third highest run scorer for the season. Great games for Levi included those against Canterbury, Burwood United and Balwyn. Based on MyCricket, Levi comfortably won the most champion player points. Levi is an excellent cricketer who should back himself to go higher.

Daniel McAlpine is an excellent cricketer who made a great contribution to the team. Dan has a lovely batting technique and is a beautiful striker of the ball. Hitting a six is a rare thing in our team, and a couple of Dan's strikes were memorable! Dan made plenty of runs, including against Canterbury and Boroondara Pythons (x2), If Dan can eliminate the odd 'get out' shot (and maybe add a yard of pace between the wickets!) he will be a formidable top order player at a much higher level than 14C. Dan always looked dangerous with the new ball, and took our second most wickets. We love Dan's attitude and his relaxed approach. We are confident that he will be a super cricketer.

Joe Macvean was a great improver, and had a fantastic season. In the previous U12B season, a 0 retired in the last game was a highlight for Joe - for Joe it all became about survival! Joe has worked hard at his game, and this year was our most productive and consistent top order bat. Joe's game is built around a solid defence. This season he added a strong attacking game and mindset, especially square of the wicket. Joe comfortably scored our highest runs (126), and performed well against a number of teams including Canterbury, Burwood United and Boroondara 3. Joe is always competitive with the ball, although this year wickets eluded him. Joe is also energetic and capable in the field. If Joe keeps working at his game, he can be a quality top order bat in higher grades.

Henry Macvean was also a great improver, and made an excellent all round contribution this year. Henry transitioned from being a tailender to an attacking upper middle order bat. Henry worked hard at his technique and strikes the ball sweetly, especially square of the wicket. Henry made our second most runs for the season (95), with good knocks against Burwood United and Surrey Hills. Henry discovered the art of leg-spin bowling, and always looked dangerous with the ball in his hand. We think that if he works at his game Henry could go far as a leggie. Henry is also a keen and competent fielder. Henry ended up with

Finn also made handy runs, including against Surrey Hills. Finn was one of our better fielders and an all round good contributor.

We also had useful cameos from **Veer Singh** and **Seb Mathews.** Veer is a keen a capable young cricketer. He almost won us the game with a sparkling lower order hand against Boroondara Pythons. Seb was always on hand to help out, and delivered hand late order runs against Balwyn Blasters

We have enjoyed being coaches, and look forward to continued involvement. We hope that all of our team pads up again next year. We think several of our players will benefit from the longer format in higher grades, being able to build an innings and get into a spell. We encourage our players to work hard at their cricket and back themselves, and challenge them to continue to improve and aim to play in the highest grade they can.

Perhaps the one thing that we didn't get quite right this year is training and development. Post COVID work and other obligations meant that we (as coaches) both couldn't commit and be present as consistently as we may have hoped. School sport and other commitments meant for the second half of the season we were at least 4 players (often more) down at training. One 60 minute session a week (often on grass and resembling a social hit) doesn't really facilitate skill development and improvement for young cricketers. We as coaches need to think about how we can support the development of our players. Hopefully the club can also access additional scarce facilities to enable a greater focus on coaching and practice.

Thank you to everyone who supported our team over the year. In particular, thank you to team manager Ben Hubbard who seemed to make herding cats and deciphering score books look easy! Thanks to all the parents and supporters who helped out, especially Raj Sebastian who was always there to fill in and lend a hand. We loved the camaraderie between the parents and the families, and the social aspect of our Friday night games. Thank you to Will Gordon, Cam McDonald and Louise Dichiera for keeping it all on track, and to the club generally for its support and encouragement.

Cricket is a great game. It is lots of fun. You learn a lot about yourself, about others, and about life. Cricket lends itself to lifelong friendships. It is a privilege to join the boys (and their families) on their cricket journey.
